# SAINT OF THE WEEK

## Ignatius of Loyola

### Facts

**Feastday:** July 31

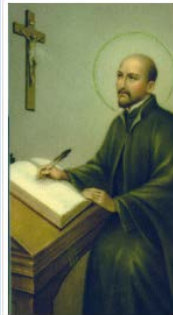
**Patron:** Dioceses of San Sebastián and Bilbao, Biscay & Gipuzkoa, Basque Country, Military Ordinariate of the Philippines, Society of Jesus, soldiers, Educators and Education.

**Birth:** 1491

**Death:** 1556

**Beatified:** July 27, 1609 by Paul V

**Canonized:** March 12, 1622 by Gregory XV



Born Inigo Lopez de Loyola in 1491 in Spain. He was the youngest of thirteen children and his mother died when he was just seven years old. He was a member of the local aristocracy and was raised accordingly. Inigo was an ambitious young man who had dreams of becoming a great leader. He was influenced by stories such as The Song of Roland and El Cid.

In 1521, while defending the town of Pamplona against French attack, Ignatius was struck by a cannonball in the legs. One leg was merely broken, but the other was badly mangled. During his 10 months of recovery that involved several surgeries, including amputation of part of one leg, Ignatius read whatever he could, which was mostly books about the life of Christ and the saints. During this time he developed a desire to become a working servant of Christ. He especially wanted to convert non-Christians.

Once he recovered and started serving the Lord, Ignatius realized that he needed to be better educated so he went back to grammar school, then at the age of 38 entered the College of Saint Barbe of the University of Paris and earned a master's degree at the age

of 44. When he applied for his doctorate, he was passed over due to his age and because of several ailments he suffered from. Eventually, he and several friends (Peter Faber and Francis Xavier) founded the Society of Jesus in 1540, and Ignatius was elected its first leader, although he felt others were more worthy and theologically experienced. Some people who did not appreciate their efforts dubbed them "**Jesuits**" in an attempt to disparage them. While the name stuck, by virtue of their good work, the label lost its negative connotation.

Ignatius imposed a strict, almost military, rule on his order. This was natural for a man who spent his youth as a soldier. It might be expected that such rigor would dissuade people from joining, but it had the opposite effect, and the order grew.

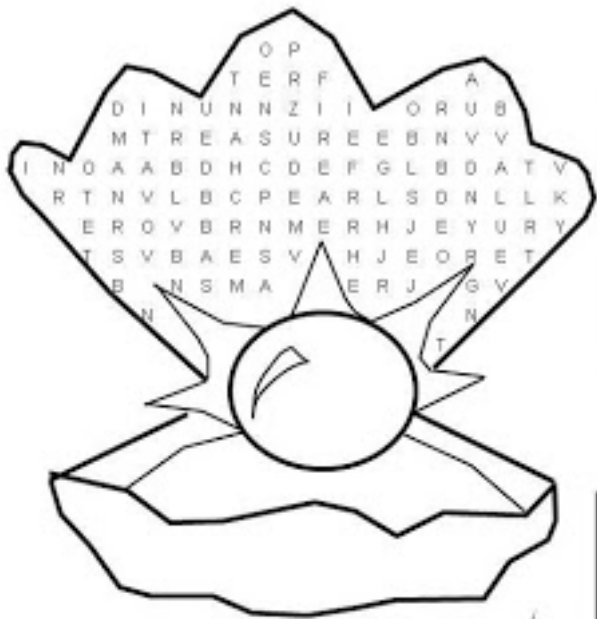
The Society of Jesus soon found its niche in education. Before Ignatius died in 1556, his order established 35 schools and boasted 1,000 members. The order was responsible for much of the work of stopping the spread of the Protestant Reformation. The Society advocated the use of reason to persuade others and combat heresy.

Today, the Society of Jesus is known for its work in educating the youth around the world. Several universities (including Loyola Universities in Chicago, New Orleans and Maryland and Loyola Marymount in L.A.) have been founded in the name of Ignatius and in the traditional Jesuit spirit. The Jesuits also perform many other important works around the globe.

St. Ignatius of Loyola was born in Spain. He was a soldier in the Spanish Army in wars against the French.

After the military he studied the saints and decided to be a soldier of the catholic faith. He finished his degree at age 43. Along with St. Francis Xavier and seven other students, started The Society of Jesus, or Jesuits in 1534.

He died at the age of 65
