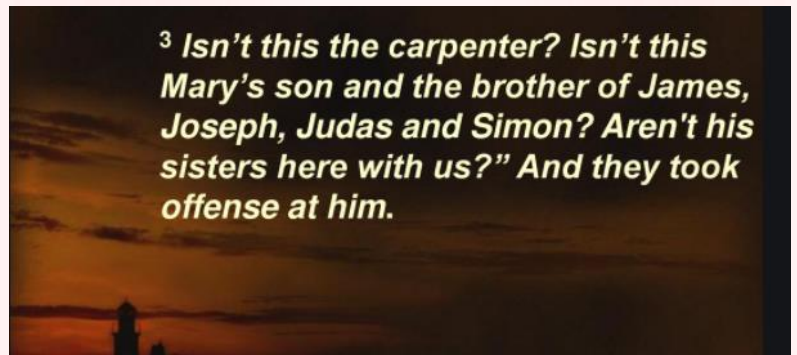
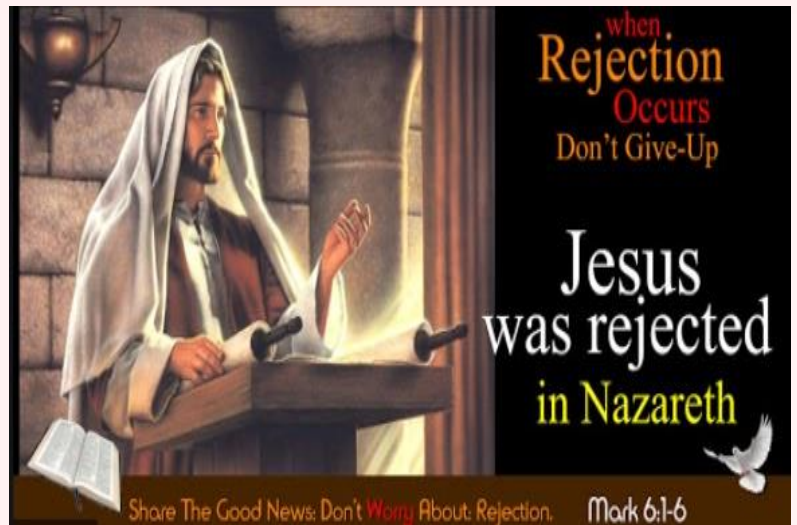

A REFLECTION

FROM DEACON ALBERT

How sure are we about what we know? How often does the reception of a message depend on what we think we “*KNOW*” about the person delivering the message? We have become entirely too comfortable with what we think we know about someone based on how they voted. Or how they dress. Or where they work. Or where they went to school. What we think we know. So we think.

It’s always a circus when a celebrity returns to their hometown. Large crowds gather to see and be seen, and to be a part of the festivities. Of course when Jesus entered a town at this point in his mission, large crowds were following him everywhere.

He had come to his hometown as a teacher. The adult men would take turns explaining the scriptures in the synagogue. The fact that Jesus did the same was nothing extraordinary. What upset the crowd was the content of his message. They were not astonished at the things he proclaimed as others had been. Rather, they were openly skeptical, and it developed into rejection.

These people were not ignorant of Jesus’ teachings, and they knew of his miracles that he had performed. They

did not question these things. What they did challenge was the source of these wonders. And their questions did not come from awe—but resentment. Just who did he think he was? The irony was, that without realizing it, they were asking **exactly** the right question—but for the wrong reason. But unfortunately, they were not interested in really knowing who he thought he was. And they weren’t interested in asking for the gift of faith or understanding.

And so, what could have been a joyful event of celebration and thanksgiving turned into a regrettable event of rejection and hard-heartedness because those townspeople knew, *they just knew*, what kind of person and who this Jesus really was. It really is quite amazing to think about, especially when you consider the low esteem the rest of Judea had for Nazareth. Remember the joke in Scripture: “Can anything good come from Nazareth?” You would think they would have eagerly embraced one of their own becoming so well-known. Instead their reaction was just the opposite.

So we come back to the original question: How sure are we about what we know? Especially when it comes to God and His revelation to us?
